This focus on preparedness was useful for us to hear as new residents of Shavano Park, yet we are hoping in the near future our Shavano Park Police, in addition to keeping its citizens safe, will also address not tolerating hate crimes nor racism nor police brutality.

Hi, Rusty Belden for our family here at Belden's Automotive & Tires. Most drivers are great at remembering to keep up with changing their vehicle's oil, but very few keep other maintenance items in good working order. These items include such services as brake fluid, transmission fluid, engine coolant, and other important items. Most vehicles today will keep running even if a maintenance item is needed, so with everyone's busy schedule, it becomes easily forgotten.

Luckily, with oil change services, drivers are reminded about their air filter, and with annual state-required inspections, driv-



ers also get reminded about their windshield wipers. If a vehicle is not brought in for a service, little else can be maintained until it becomes too late. Here are a few maintenance items that are most likely to be overlooked:

- · Brake fluid: Fluid in your brakes can absorb moisture over time, making the level look fine but rusting out the system. The owner's manual can guide you when to have the fluid replaced but if it is not specified, we recommend every two years or 30,000 miles.
- · Battery: Most often "maintenance-free," but drivers should still periodically have technicians remove any corrosion that builds upon the terminals.
- Transmission Fluid: Fluid for your transmission should generally be bright red; any other color is an indication that there may be a problem. Generally, transmission fluid should be serviced every two years or 30,000 miles.
- Engine Coolant: Fluid for your engine's coolant is usually red, green, blue, or yellow. If it looks colorless, rusty, or has things floating around, it is an indication that your fluid must be serviced. Generally, engine coolant should also be serviced every two years or 30,000 miles.
- Timing Belt: Should be changed per the driver's owner's manual. If this is overlooked, it may cause the belt to break or snap, leaving the car stranded and could even cause catastrophic failure of the vehicle's engine.

The best way to avoid overlooking these maintenance items and more is to maintain a good relationship with a trusted automotive repair shop - they can keep tabs on your car's maintenance record and keep you up to date on your vehicle's services. BACK **Bigger and** Better than Before

Some might say the world stopped on Wednesday, March 18. Others may say their world came to an end. The youth sports industry would tell you both. In a matter of a couple of days, everyone's world came to a stop and there was nothing anyone could do about it.

In an industry that has historically been recession-proof and where "keeping up with the Joneses" is status quo, youth sports saw just that.

Until May 18, when most indoor sport "workouts" were allowed to resume, life was simple ... too simple. My wife and I run an indoor sports and recreation center here in San Antonio, based around USAV club volleyball and AAU basketball practices and tournaments. We keep very close contact with some local volleyball, basketball, soccer and baseball clubs around town as well and all have had the same quandary: how do you pick up the pieces from a lost club season and salvage your reputation, your finances, and your service, yet still move forward and restore your customer base's faith in you?

Many restrictions have changed the outlook of the youth sports industry. Since May 18 when phase two of re-opening took place, most places you go for any of these activities will have safety

precautions in place like public restrooms and concession stands being closed, individual waters required for athletes, temperature checks on the way in, masks upon entry and exit (masks optional ONLY during participation/working out), social distancing, equipment cleaned regularly throughout each day, and hand sanitizer on the way in and out.

The reality is that our world thrives on competition and sports (not always at the same time). During the shutdown, the lack of both of these in everyone's lives affected everyone differently. We have seen a drastic increase in depression in youth since March 18 and there has been an indirect increase in childhood obesity over the last five months as well. Once competition and sports were taken away from society indefinitely, no one knew what to do.

I genuinely believe we are past the worst of this pandemic as it relates to business and the shutdown fears. Surely we will feel the effects of this for years to come, and there are still plenty who are uncomfortable going out in public, but it seems our world has been able to find a counterbalance to mitigating health risks and mitigating the need for social/physical interaction and competition. Sports are starting up again and places like our sports and recreation center are busier than we were at this time last year. We expect this might revert as school starts up again, but there is one



thing we have learned: private sports (aka, Youth Sports Industry) have thrived since the re-opening due to government regulation and power over the extracurricular activities within schools.

The private youth sports industry has seen a drastic increase in registrations and participation in the last three months, simply because middle school and high school sports may offer limited options in the short-term future. We could potentially see an industry shift of sports participation into the private sector in the coming years because of these restrictions and I think the sole benefactor is the youth of society. While education is always the number one



Thanksgiving usually conjures up visions of a feast! If you are planning to host the family or friends for a dinner party OR going to join family and want to provide great wines to enjoy, we have lots of recommendations! Remember that this meal can work with many different wines, so bringing a variety is a good plan to please the many palates that might be joining you.

When considering what type of wine to serve with different menus for Thanksgiving, consider the concepts below:

Chardonnay is a great, everyday wine. But it can be too buttery/ oaky and intense to be among our best Thanksgiving wine picks (unless you opt for unoaked Naked Chardonnay). Instead, you might want to try white wines that are refreshing, tangy, and fruity, to pair with the lighter Thanksgiving salads and sides. Suggestions include:

• **Washington Riesling**. This off dry Riesling is fruity but it's lower in sugars so it has the tang that will work with salads as well as a great pairing with turkey or ham.



German Gewurztraminer. For a sweeter choice, our German Gewurztraminer will delight those who tend toward sweet

wines as their favorites.
Rosé is the "Bomb." Hop on the trend for a Thanksgiving wine that will rack up those likes. Crisp, light, and fruity, this lovely light pink wine might be the ideal Thanksgiving wine to accompany a heavy holiday meal. Serve it chilled. We have a Chilean Rose that is crisp and tart, and a French Rose with light sweetness like Viognier or Riesling. The blush in the rose brings with it a slightly higher flavor profile that our whites, so for those who can't taste much in a white wine, Rose may be just what the doctor ordered.

Yes, you can serve red wine with turkey. BUT you may not want to serve Cabernet because it is generally too tart and high in tannins to match well with turkey. But you can serve a lighter red with moderate acidity to cut through the richness. The light berry brightness of red wine for Thanksgiving contrasts well with the heartiness of the classic menu.

- Pinot Noir: Younger wines are fruity with the essence of plums, strawberries, cherries, and raspberries. Our Sonoma Pinot Noir is more intense and dryer than the Chilean Pinot Noir, which brings more fruit flavors with it, so pick the Pinot that fits your taste best.
- **Zinfandel**: Lots of intense, plummy, jammy flavors with spicy or peppery notes bring good contrast to turkey but compliment the spiciness of pork dishes we might see at Thanksgiving.

Of course, if you are serving up some big red meats like prime rib, or brisket, then bring out the Cabernets with their wonderful tannins.

- **Super Tuscan Rosso** pairs great with any meat seasoned and cooked outside on the grill for those looking for an alternative to the normal "Thanksgiving Fare."
- **Rattlesnake Cab/Shiraz** will also be wonderful pairings for your red meats, consisting of bold flavors and the ability to bring out the smoky flavor of the meal!

As you can see, there are a ton of options for you to become a "Wine Connoisseur" over Thanksgiving! We would love to see you stop by and see us in October/November here at the Stray Grape! For Yourself: An increasing number of adults and retirees are heading back to school to learn about subjects that interest them or to immerse themselves in hobbies and interests. These types of endeavors don't usually qualify for the IRS allowances and credits listed above. However, colleges and universities often offer reduced-price or even free classes for those of retirement age. And remember that if your hobby or interest makes money — you're selling baked goods regularly or have backorders for homemade furniture, for instance — you may want to consider turning it into a tax-advantaged business, which can help convert those casual education expenses back into tax deductions.

For Your Family: Education is a huge expense for many young families, which means some grandparents want to help out however they can. The IRS is on board with many of the same allowances we list above. AOTC or LLC credits usually aren't given unless the child is your dependent, but you may still be able to take tax-free distributions of retirement funds or contribute to and/or distribute from 529 education funds for child and grand-child education expenses. And you might not even want to wait until college to start helping out. Right now, the federal government and the State of Texas allow 529 savings plan funds to be used for private K-12 tuition as well (but beware: some states outside of Texas will penalize you).



seen in my career," states Amanda Mitchell, registered nurse. She is a travel nurse, who was sent to Jersey City, NJ, to help medical staff there.

She continues, "I have multiple friends that were already working in 'hot zones' when the coronavirus hit. To say they were overwhelmed is a massive understatement. At that point, all I had heard were stories from fellow RNs and MDs of how bad the situations in ICUs really are."

Mitchell relates that normally ICU nurses have two patients assigned. With the COVID-19 outbreak, the patients are sick enough to qualify for a 1:1 ratio, but due to the overwhelming number of patients, the units are running with three to four patients to one nurse.

"The weekend before I got up to Jersey City, my preceptor had four patients, and three of those patients 'expired' and were quickly replaced with even sicker patients. These nurses are truly superheroes. There is absolutely no way you can prepare yourself for what they have been dealing with and, thankfully, it's slowing down a bit."

Amanda graduated from Clark High School and attended Texas Tech University. She is the daughter of Jackie and Wiley Mitchell, residents of Shavano Park. After changing majors multiple times, she came back to Shavano Park.

"One of my friends had recently enrolled in nursing school and told me all about it and how she was really enjoying it and how challenging it was." Mitchell was able to shadow a nurse at the University Hospital Emergency Room and enjoyed it. "I knew I had found my calling and enrolled at the local Baptist School of Health Professions."

Amanda has had her own experience with receiving medical care as a patient, surviving a battle with colon cancer, even spending some time in the ICU. This experience motivated her to become an ICU RN, to "help others when they are at their most vulnerable." She ended up being hired in the Methodist Specialty and Transplant ICU, where she continued to learn every day. At that point, "(she) knew that (she) was ready to spread (her) wings and start (her) traveling nurse career," which just so happened to coincide with the start of the pandemic.

Mitchell states that she has never felt so fulfilled in her career. "This is WHY I got into nursing. My heart is filled with pride when I hear the clapping and cheering from the community for the medical staff daily at shift change." The staff was provided with meals, skincare products, gift cards to local coffee shops, etc.

Amanda finishes with this thought, "In the midst of all of this death and devastation, there is also such beauty in this community. I am amazed by the beauty of blooming cherry trees abundantly lining all of the streets here. People are out and about with their children and dogs while staying safe by maintaining distance and wearing face coverings. The chilly early morning sunrises over-looking the Hudson River and lower Manhattan remind me that we, as a country, have been knocked down before but with grit and determination were able to get up and rebuild. I am so very grateful that I am able to help in any way to defeat this awful virus and support the amazing nurses that are putting their lives on the line every day."
